The Curriculum Y Cwricwlwm

Croesyceiliog School is an English medium school. All students study the full range of subjects demanded by the current National Curriculum. These are divided into core subjects and foundation subjects making up a fortnightly timetable of 50 lessons.

- There are three core subjects: English, Mathematics and Science.
- The remaining subjects are foundation subjects: History, Geography, Modern Languages, Art, Music, Technology and Information Technology.
- The three statutory subjects Religious Education, Physical Education and Welsh are compulsory in Years 7 11.

The school is working towards implementation of the new Curriculum for Wales for Year 7 in 2022.

- All students are encouraged to participate and are exposed to Welsh cultural tradition
- Students are encouraged to use their language skills both inside and outside the classroom





Student Wellbeing and Pastoral Care *Lles Disgyblion a Gofal Bugeiliol*

The staff at Croesyceiliog School are committed to providing an outstanding education for our students. This is reflected in our school culture which is centred upon the principles of equality of opportunity and inclusion. The curriculum reflects this, being carefully designed to meet the needs and aspirations of all learners. The welfare and wellbeing of students is the prime concern of all staff and the school has an excellent reputation for being a caring community.

The Wellbeing Team has many layers in order to provide a robust support system for our students. Year groups are led by Leaders of Wellbeing, non-teaching members of staff who are available to support their year groups throughout the day. Leaders of Wellbeing are responsible for maintaining a positive school ethos and for closely monitoring both the attitude to learning and the wellbeing of students across all Key Stages. Leaders of Wellbeing work closely with our Directors of Wellbeing, who have overall responsibility for each Key Stage. All students are assigned to a form group, led by a Form Tutor. Form Tutors register their classes each morning whilst, in the afternoon, students are registered by their subject teachers. The Form Tutor plays an essential part in the smooth running of the school and in providing support and guidance for all the students in their form. Form Tutors are responsible, in the first instance, for addressing issues regarding conduct, uniform, punctuality and attendance. If necessary, these issues may be passed on to the relevant Leader of Wellbeing.

Our school environment is a safe and caring community where there are excellent relationships between adults and students and amongst the students themselves.

Croesyceiliog ALN Department Adran ALN Croesyceiliog

A person has additional learning needs (ALN) if they have a significantly greater difficulty in learning than the majority of others, of the same age. The School has the responsibility for meeting the needs of all students, and teachers are expected to differentiate their teaching so that all students make expected progress. Person-centred approaches are used when planning provision, taking into account the views of all students with ALN. As part of this process, one page student profiles are produced that provide a pen portrait of the student, including their preferences. This helps to ensure that teachers have an excellent knowledge of all students, including how best to meet their individual needs.

What will support will look like for your child?

- Regular check-ins with students to monitor progress and wellbeing
- Targeted interventions in Literacy, Numeracy and Nurture
- An Individual Development Plan (IDP) outlining strategies to best support your child
- Close links with parents/carers and outside agencies working alongside us to ensure the child s needs are met
- Exam access arrangements

Very occasionally a young person will have a significantly greater difficulty in learning than the majority of their peers. In these cases, it may be necessary to make referrals to the Education and Child Psychology Service. Specialist staff from the Local Authority may provide input on a regular on-going basis.

The Additional Learning Needs Coordinator (ALNCO) works closely with Senior Staff, Wellbeing Leads and an ALN Link Governor to ensure that all students with ALN play a full and active part in school life, having the same rights to the full range of curriculum opportunities enjoyed by their peers.

Religious Education is a compulsory part of the curriculum for all students. In Religious Education lessons, students are given the opportunity explore the principle beliefs and practices of major Western and Eastern religions and to reflect on their own experiences of life and the possible meaning it has. Students also investigate the impact of the Christian faith as the dominant religion of the United Kingdom and learn to appreciate the impact it has on their own lives. At no point is one religious belief promoted over another. Instead, students research the views of various religious believers and nonbelievers on a range of religious and ethical issues before forming their own justified opinions on matters of morality and spirituality.

Croesyceiliog school fulfils its obligations under the 1944 Education Act to provide students with the opportunity to experience a non-denominational and broadly Christian act of worship through regular assemblies. Furthermore, students discuss and reflect upon a daily Thought for the Day in form time. The Thought for the Day is formulated around a given theme which can be moral or topical in nature and this is explored over the course of a week.

Attitude to Learning Learning, Respect, Ambition Hagwedd at Ddysgu

The highly effective focus on wellbeing, and the support in place for all students, underpins the positive attitude to learning which is prevalent throughout the school. Staff foster positive relationships with our students and this has established a school culture that supports effective teaching and learning in a safe, calm and fair environment. We have very high expectations of the standard of behaviour of our students and these are grounded in our Learning Manifesto.

We have very clear values; We SEEK learning, we EXPECT respect, we APPLAUD ambition.

These ensure that everyone within the school community can flourish and develop.

Students are admitted to the school in natural progression from local Primary Schools. Families that move into the catchment area are requested to contact the Local Authority in order to facilitate the transfer as the Local Authority deals with the admission of students. Families then contact the school for an appointment with the appropriate Director of Wellbeing and Senior Leader responsible for Wellbeing and Equity.







Recognising and Rewarding Achievement Adnabod a Gwobrwyo Cyrhaeddiad

In order to promote a positive attitude to learning, Croesyceiliog has established a clear and consistent pathway to rewards. We use ClassCharts to reward achievement and progress in all aspects of school life. ClassChart points are awarded for academic achievement, progress and effort. We also recognise students who display exemplary behaviour, who are good friends, students who are kind and who fully immerse themselves in our school community. We regularly recognise our learning heroes who exceed expectations. It is intended that all students should be able to benefit from this system as it recognises all levels and areas of achievement.

Parents and students are able to view their ClassCharts awards in real time using an app. Excellent attendance is recognised in form time with inter form competitions and during celebratory assemblies where certificates are awarded.

Pupils ask pertinent questions, and collaborate in a mature fashion to support each other s learning.

Transition Pontio

Excellent links exist between primary feeder schools and ourselves which help to ensure a smooth transition from Primary to Secondary education. Staff meet with Primary colleagues and the students themselves to gather as much information as possible before creating optimum learning groups. We offer a range of transition activities throughout the year; we host wellbeing projects, involve Year 6 in our Senedd so their voice is heard, and share their work with our school community. Students are involved in a taster day where they experience the curriculum opportunities offered by our Areas Of Learning and Experience (AOLEs.) Those students who require additional support receive an enhanced transition. A Transition Booklet is issued to Year 6 students and a Parents Evening is held where our families have the opportunity to have all of their questions answered.

Anti-Bullying Gwrth-Fwlio

Croesyceiliog School will not tolerate bullying of any type. We have clear policies on Anti-bullying and Cyber Bullying that are shared with all pupils, staff and parents.

The policies are aligned to and conversant with the recent Welsh Government statutory guidance around challenging bullying. There are a variety of ways in which pupils and parents can report behaviours about which they are concerned and we ask that this information is passed on immediately so that the school is able to address behaviours swiftly.

Safeguarding Policy Polisi Amddiffyn a Diogelu Plant

The school has a robust Safeguarding Policy that aligns with Local and National Government statutory guidance and safeguarding procedures are constantly reviewed and evaluated. All staff, both teaching and non-teaching, receive yearly safeguarding training. All members of the Senior Leadership Team and Wellbeing Leaders have received additional safeguarding training to support the wellbeing of all young people at our school. The school has a Designated Safeguarding Person and Deputy Safeguarding Officer. We use My Concern to log, track and monitor all safeguarding concerns raised.
